

tanding in the front hall at Johnson School, just as most kids are headed home for the day, I watch as tutoring is getting started. Buses are called, walkers and riders head out the door, but some lucky students gather to wait for their tutors to appear. Watching the kids and tutors as they begin their time together is such a blessing as the individual stories unfold...one tutor with one child, lives being changed right in

There's the quiet smile of a third grade girl as she walks down the hall with her tutor of three years. Who would have

imagined that she would win the Martin Luther King Essay contest and be introduced to the School Board?

Look at that first grade Hispanic student, chattering away in English, with such a smile for his tutor. He will end the year on grade level, launched and secure in a new country.

That mischievous second grade boy, whose home life is so complicated, will get his homework completed as his parents and teachers have requested. What a difference that will make when he arrives at school prepared for the next day.

Here comes a first grade girl, beads swinging and clicking in her hair, eager to see her tutor today. When she is reminded that the schedule has changed, that she has to wait until tomorrow, there are tears. An incredulous nearby parent says, "You mean she's crying because she WANTS to come to tutoring?" Yes. That's it exactly.

A kindergarten teacher comes by, stopping to say she's so glad one of her little girls is now in the program. She can see a huge difference in her since she started.

Here comes the regular, a first grade boy who checks in every single day. "Is THIS my tutoring day?" He

s the summer neared I was given the opportunity to create and administer a program for a small group of guys (ages 13-15) that ▲ I have been able to get to know over the course of my first two years with the ministry. I wanted to engage them as young adults and provide an environment where they could be heard, respected, and valued. I also wanted to give them an opportunity to engage with the arts, allowing them to explore new ways to express themselves. This way they could discover hidden talents and new desires in a positive environment. I also sought to show them the Gospel in a way that would allow them to interact with it in real life settings.

Each day we read a chapter from Robert Lupton's book, *Theirs is the* Kingdom, then would reflect and discuss our thoughts on the section. This book consists of small chapters where Lupton and his family are faced with conflicts, scenarios, and real life stories about interacting with unique challenges as they try to bring forth the Kingdom in inner city Atlanta. I was thoroughly impressed and pleased with their desire to interact with the sections. They were often challenged by Lupton's dilem-

mas and his desire to live out the sacrificial love of Jesus for the world. I was continually impressed with their thoughts and impressions on the readings.

The other aspect of the summer program that dealt with the arts was not possible without the support and help from many friends from the Charlottesville community. We were able to do a variety of engaging activities. One of the first weeks we received digital cameras for each guy to use, generously donated for the week from various friends. We also had the benefit of having Carrie Yoder come explain how cameras work and the artistic elements and styles used by photographers.

Another week we had the benefit of having local visual artist, Kate Daughdrill, provide her time, resources, and knowledge to us. She inspired the boys with her own work, introduced them to the McGuffey Art Center and supported and encouraged them as they engaged their own creativity. Thanks to Carrie, Kate, and everyone that let us borrow their cameras and wisdom for making these weeks possible.

One of the boys' highlights of the summer was the last week with local musician Bernard Hankins. With his help the boys created their own beats and lyrics. Before this week we traditionally ended the day with the guys' favorite activity, a hardcore basketball game. But now they were sacrificing their time on the court for more time writing lines and laying beats. Bernard inspired the boys by introducing them to his own work and explaining how he made it. He also graciously let us use his keyboards, microphones, turntables, speakers and other gadgets. By the end of the week two songs were created and the guys were ready to sign their first record label.

It was an honor to work with these young men and see how the Lord has been slowly impacting them over the last two years. My faith was challenged and encouraged by my relationships with the guys this summer. I was extremely blessed and thankful for the support from so many believers who truly made this summer possible. I'm also very thankful for the support given to me by the members of Trinity Presbyterian's City Parish. Thanks to them we had a nutritious and filling lunch everyday. As I look back on how smoothly the summer went and all the help I had I am brought to my knees with thankfulness and humility for the Lord's provisions and faithfulness to us. §

knows that his day is Tuesday, but one gets the sense that he wishes every day was Tuesday.

There goes a third grader with his tutor, who lives in the Prospect community and connects with him and his little brother in the neighborhood often. This capable boy could have a whole different life outlook because of this faithful mentor.

Sometimes there is resistance because the homework is hard, the reading is just not smooth and the numbers are hard to figure out, but here comes the tutor of a struggling second grader who has not given up despite the hard times. The tutor shows up, and with infinite patience works through those hard times to reach a sense of accomplishment and completion. Perseverance is important, even when you're 8 years old.

What about that fourth grader, the one who couldn't stay in his chair a few years ago? How many awards did he receive at fourth grade graduation? He will be at Walker this year, a model of how ESL students can succeed in our community.

Out on the playground, as we gather to begin, there's a second grade girl with eyes searching, searching for her tutor, who hasn't yet arrived. Her eyes light up as the tutor hurries up the sidewalk, a little bit late, but so importantly there.

There are no words that can adequately describe these pictures. They are a tangible vision of God's presence and grace here in the community. Lives will be changed in ways that we cannot imagine. Thank you.
