anuary 19, 2009-- It was the 7th annual Martin Luther King Day Celebration and we gathered at CALM for a day-long event orga-Inized by Americorps VISTA staff to celebrate the spirit of service that MLK embodies.

Music and words of remembrance consecrated the day in the front yard of 834 Prospect (CALM Community House) as participants gathered for pizza lunch and a mini-health fair, coordinated by Carey Bailey and Claire Moore. Stations included first aid, blood pressure checks, information on local health services, a kids' hand washing activity, and dental care. Thanks to all the nurses and student nurses who volunteered to help!

Next, service projects commenced starting with a neighborhood walking trash collection. All trash was sorted for recyclables by more than a dozen kids, who then went to the Recycling Center on McIntire This Road to see first-hand how trash is collected for reuse.

In the afternoon K-4th graders created the banner for the Memorial March which took place at dusk, while 5th-8th graders worked either on a creative writing/drawing project based on their own dreams for the community, or a music and rhythm workshop, led by Bernard Hankins. Two adult discussion forums were held-- one at the church building about community dreams, and a second at the Blue Ridge Commons Community Center. There Dr. Don Blake encouraged listeners to "act on their potential" with his presentation "Don't let the Dream turn into a Nightmare."

The evening events began with a candlelight march through the Prospect neighborhood, and trumpet accompaniment by Doug Granger, Assistant Principal of Agnor-Hurt Elementary.

### ¿Sabes por qué damos regalos en By Claire Moore

o you know why we give gifts at Christmas? So starts the story of Christ's birth when read to children- in Spanish or English.

Like lots of her friends, Lorena's heritage is Hispanic but she is being raised in America. She goes to elementary school at Johnson and learns about American culture and language as well as her own Mexican culture. But her parents are another story. Like others of Latino background in Charlottesville, they are still hampered by limited

English. It's hard to learn the language, since the

men work long hours every day, usually alongside other Latino workers speaking primarily Spanish. The women often stay home all day caring for children and they too have few opportunities to practice English.

Abundant Life has been building relationships with Latino children through tutoring programs and after-school clubs, and through them has begun to reach out to their parents. English tutors have begun meeting with some of the adults weekly, working one-on-one with

them to improve conversation, increase vocabulary, and build confidence.

We've also sponsored social gatherings to bring families

together. Last fall CALM had a dinner attended by over 40 people, during which we talked about the work of Abundant Life and how it can serve them. In December, continued on page 4
